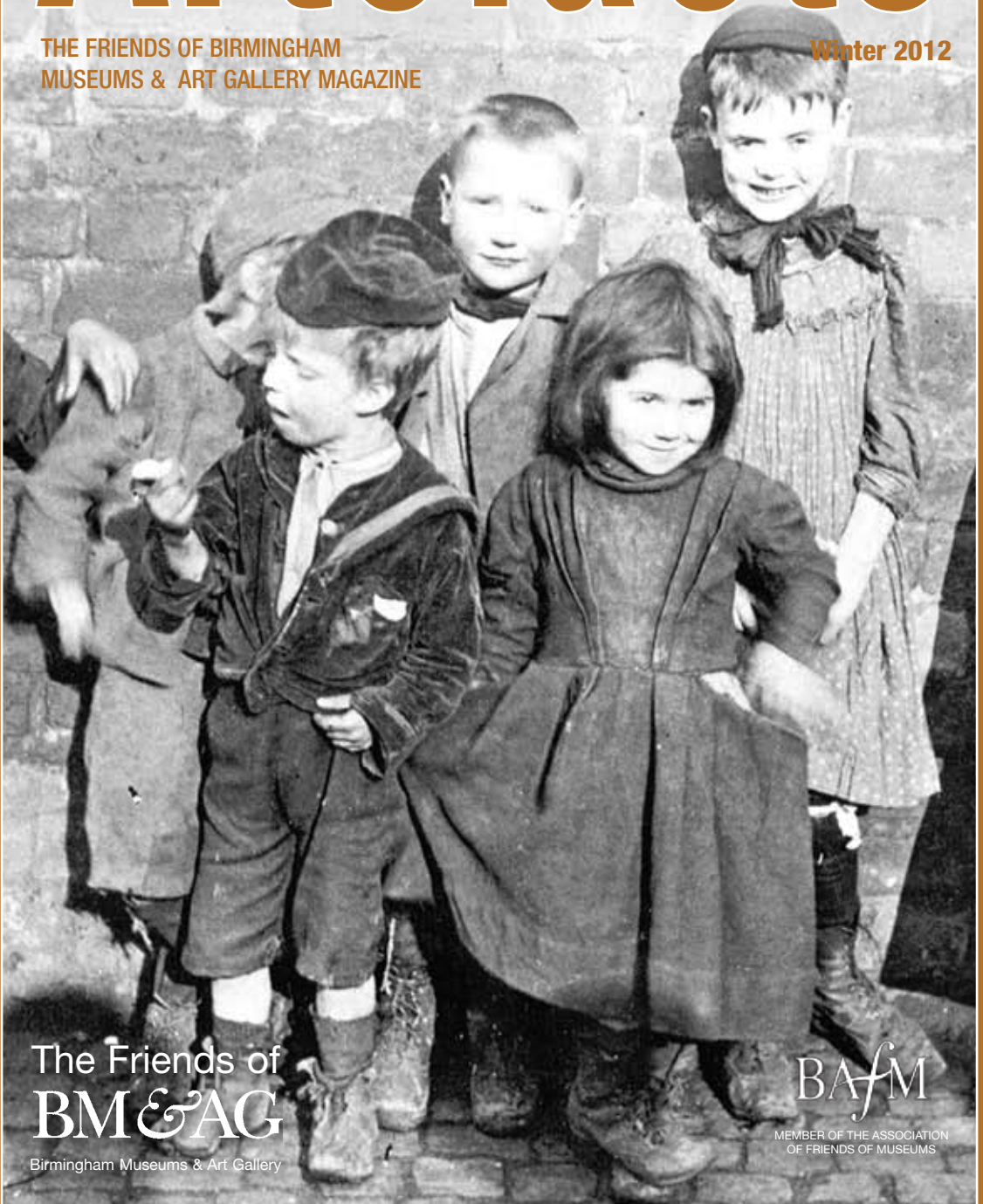

Another high point has been the exciting research and conservation continuing on the Staffordshire Hoard, as a result of both high and low technology work. The National Geographic Exhibition opened in Washington at the beginning of November, demonstrating impressive

visitor numbers already. We hope to be running some Friends' events in the middle of the year to bring us up to date with the latest findings – and the new questions! More details in the next Artefacts.

The new History Galleries on the second floor of BMAG are coming on apace and the new oculus where our commissioned work will hang is looking impressive. We have two events in March (12th and 13th) when you will be able to see a model of the work which will fill this space and meet the artists. Do book early! The opening of this new gallery, telling the story of Birmingham and its growth as a major city, is an exciting event to look forward to later in the year.

You will have noticed a change to the look and feel of Artefacts this quarter. This is an idea of our publishers to help keep the magazine up-to-date, fresh and of interest to new audiences, which also brings wider publicity for us. We are keeping it under review and would welcome your comments on the changes. We hope you like it!

Art, which has the power to challenge, also has the power to uplift, to restore hope and to bring joy. Make this the year when you seek out the artefacts that do this for you and let them work their power on you.

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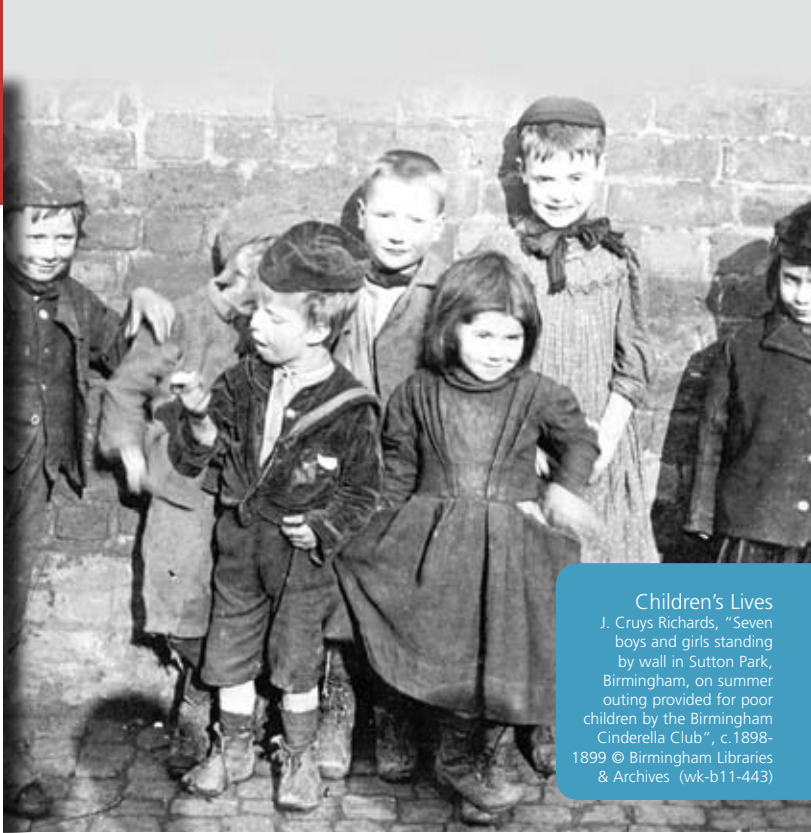

Thursday 23 February at 12 noon. We have arranged our annual visit to the College of Food in UCB, Summer Row. Our speaker will be Professor Colin Gough, eminent Birmingham scientist and founder Trustee of Think Tank, Birmingham's Science Museum. He will be speaking about Think Tank's early vision, how this has developed over

the last ten years and how he sees its future. As all the Birmingham museums move closer to becoming a single Trust including Think Tank, this is most timely for the Friends.

Stratford-Upon-Avon – "Shakespeare's Houses" & Stratford Armories Museum

Friday 11 May 2012. On arrival in Stratford you will be free to visit Shakespeare's Birthplace, Nash's House & New Place (Shakespeare's final home) and Hall's Croft (the Jacobean home of Shakespeare's daughter). They are all within half a mile so whilst it will be easy to see them all, it is not essential as your ticket will be valid for any number of visits for 12 months.

Mid afternoon we will rejoin the coach to travel to the Stratford Armories Museum which is three miles north of Stratford at Pathlow. The museum offers a broad collection of antique arms and armour from many different centuries and cultures. Outside is a replica of Leonardo-da-Vinci's giant crossbow and various cannons.

There is a life-size armoured Indian elephant, a display of full and half suits of armour which were formerly exhibited at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York. The Aeronautical Gallery displays models of World War I & II aeroplanes; it also includes the Wellington Aviation Collection and a tail section of a Wellington bomber.

Before we leave we will have afternoon tea, coffee and cakes (included).



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Rita McLean's Winter Report

It is with great sadness that I have to begin my report with news of the unexpected and untimely death of Jackie Swancutt, a member of our senior management team, following an accident. Jackie had worked for BMAG since June 1991 when she first joined the staff as an administrator. As BMAG's Planning & Support Manager, much of Jackie's work was carried out 'behind the scenes', but was central and fundamental to all aspects of our activities. Her administrative and organisational skills were second to none and personally as well as professionally Jackie was very generous in the willing support she gave to her museum friends and colleagues. Jackie will be greatly missed and we all regret that she did not have the opportunity to enjoy the retirement she was about to embark on and return as planned to continue to support BMAG in a voluntary capacity. My colleagues and I are grateful to the Friends for electing to receive donations from her family, friends and colleagues to enable an acquisition for BMAG's collections in Jackie's memory.

Turning to museum business - I reported in the last edition of *Artefacts* that the Staffordshire Hoard was due to go international with a major display at the National Geographic Museum in Washington DC. To give an update on this, I am pleased to report that the exhibition of the top 100 items from the Hoard opened on 31st October 2011 and to great acclaim. As part of the opening events Curator Dr David Symons was invited alongside colleagues from Stoke Museum and the British Museum to take part in a panel discussion which followed a screening of the 2nd National Geographic documentary about the Hoard.

The exhibition itself is proving really popular. National Geographic report that this is coming second only to their exhibition of the Terracotta Warriors! The Director in Washington emailed me recently to say 'The day after our Thanksgiving holiday (last Thursday of November) is traditionally the most-visited day for Washington museums. This past Friday was no exception for us; we had 1508 visitors that day and 1224 on Saturday. That brings our total as of close of business yesterday (28th November) to 13,812'

In case you are not aware, BMAG's Hoard display has moved out of Gallery 16 to make way for the *da Vinci* exhibition and is currently in Gallery 12 - *How Art Is Made*.

I hope you have had chance to visit the current Gas Hall exhibition '*Lost in Lace: New approaches by UK and international artists*' – it really does look spectacular and of course is a complete contrast to *The Home of Metal* in style! As of 12th January there had been 22,885 visitors to this exhibition (50% above the expected target to date).

Thanks to all those Friends who visited Aston Hall by Candlelight this year. With almost 11,000 tickets sold, Gurinder Kenth, Rachel Hunter Rowe and their team pulled out all the stops to ensure the successful staging of the event – as ever a popular part of the BMAG calendar.

Regarding the development of the History Galleries, firstly, my apologies for the difficulties getting around the building caused by all the ongoing works. By the time *Artefacts* is published though, the disruption will have ended. Having visited the third floor I can readily say that the result will be worth it. The oculus at the end of the Bridge (beyond the Round Room) looks fantastic and will make so much difference to the look of this part of the building.

We were pleased to host a visit by Sir Mervyn King on 27 October to officially launch the new £50 note, featuring Birmingham's own Matthew Boulton, and James Watt. BMAG was presented with two crisp new notes for

our collection for display at BMAG and at Soho House.

Also as reported in the previous edition of *Artefacts*, work on the BMAG's move to charitable Trust status continues. Consultation with staff concerning the transfer is well underway, the permanent post of Director for the new Birmingham Museums Trust has been advertised nationally, and Birmingham City Council's Cabinet confirmed ongoing funding levels for the Trust for 2012-2015 on 12 December.

The other crucial funding bid for the Arts Council Major Grants programme was submitted in November. This is the new model to replace the MLA Renaissance in the Regions funding that BMAG has received since 2003. A decision on this is expected on 27 January 2012. If successful the funding will again be for the period 2012-15.

Finally, on behalf of all the staff at BMAG I would like to take this opportunity to wish you all a very Happy New Year. As with every year of the Friends existence, BMAG would be unable to function in the same way without the help and support of ALL the Friends. We will continue to keep you informed of the changes and developments for BMAG as 2012 unfolds.

LOST IN LACE

Until 19 February 2012. Step into a world of lace as you've never seen it before. See how the symbolic language, patterns and techniques of lace are represented through radical new approaches by UK and international artists. Featuring large scale, theatrical and visually spectacular work, this exhibition challenges perceptions of what lace can be, involving the visitor in an environment where spaces become fluid and thread creates entirely new boundaries

CHILDREN'S LIVES

Saturday 24 March 2012 – Sunday 10 June 2012.
Children's Lives will be the first exhibition in the UK to trace the changing nature of childhood from the 18th century to the present day, through fine art, photography, film, objects, toys, sound archives and documentary sources. Much of the material in the exhibition has never previously been displayed.

The exhibition will feature works by nationally and internationally celebrated artists: Reynolds, Gainsborough, Rossetti, Millais, Watts, Munch, Picasso and Rego, Bill Brandt's documentary photography of the 1930s and 40s commissioned by Cadbury, and Nick Hedges powerful photographs for SHELTER in the late 70s.

Children's Lives aims to bring the voice of the child out of the archive and the museum collections and draw the connections between the past and the present into sharper focus. It will also show how the world of the child has been constructed by adults. *Children's Lives* is a charging exhibition so bring your membership card for free entrance.

In the Main Galleries

GALLERY 12 - THE STAFFORDSHIRE HOARD

This small selection of beautiful finds of July 2009 still attracts much attention.

GALLERY 16 – TEN DRAWINGS BY LEONARDO DA VINCI: A DIAMOND JUBILEE CELEBRATION

Until 25 March 2012. To celebrate the Diamond Jubilee of Her Majesty The Queen, ten of the Royal Collection's finest drawings by the Renaissance master Leonardo da Vinci (1452-1519) will travel to five museums and galleries across the United Kingdom. BMAG is the first venue on this national tour.

The exhibition has been selected to show the extraordinary scope of Leonardo's interests: painting and sculpture, engineering, botany, mapmaking, hydraulics and anatomy.

Through drawing, Leonardo attempted to record and understand the world around him. He maintained that an image transmitted knowledge more accurately and concisely than any words.

Beyond a handful of paintings, most of Leonardo's great projects were never completed. His surviving drawings

are therefore our main source of knowledge of his extraordinary achievements. This exhibition – the first ever showing of works by Leonardo in Birmingham – is a unique opportunity to discover his genius at first hand.

The free exhibition has been kindly sponsored by Coutts. Morning and Evening events have been arranged in conjunction with this exhibition.

The picture below is quite an intriguing one as it may be a self-portrait, although is not proven so but was done when Leonardo was a similar age.

GALLERY 20 – A LIFE IN PRINTS: THE TESSA SIDNEY BEQUEST

Until 4 March 2012. Tessa Sidney, Curator of Prints and Drawings at BMAG for nearly 30 years, died on New Year's Day 2011 after a long illness. Tessa generously bequeathed to the Museum 33 20th-century prints, drawings and studio ceramics from her private collection.

This exhibition celebrates Tessa's contribution to the

Museum and Art Gallery. It displays a selection of works from her bequest, additional prints kindly donated by her executors, and some of the many significant acquisitions Tessa made for BMAG in her role as curator of prints and drawings.

GALLERY 20 - STYLE IN AFRICA



31 March – 2 September 2012. *Style in Africa* explores the rich textile heritage of West Africa. In this collaborative exhibition, curators from the museum have joined forces with young people to create new ways to present the significant West African textile collection from BMAG, the University of Birmingham and Craftspace.

This free project uses the changing traditions of woven, embroidered, printed and dyed clothing and textiles, and focuses on textiles produced from the early 20th century up to 2011.

CELEBRATING 200 YEARS OF CHARLES DICKENS - A TALK BY LUCINDA HAWKSLEY
Sunday 12 February, 2pm. The 7th February 2012 marks two centuries since the birth of Charles Dickens. Most people know about Dickens the novelist but far fewer people know about Dickens the man. Author Lucinda

Hawksley has written a new book about her great great grandfather to celebrate his bicentenary. Lucinda will give a talk about the lesser-known aspects of Charles Dickens' life including what he was like as a husband and father, his talent for acting, his desire to be a detective and his love of travelling. She will also talk about his social conscience, the changes he made in his society and why he still remains relevant today.

Lucinda Dickens Hawksley is the great great grand-daughter of Charles Dickens and a patron of the Charles Dickens Museum in London. She has written over 20 books, including *Lizzie Siddal*, *The Tragedy of a Pre-Raphaelite Supermodel* (2004) and *Katy, the Life and Loves of Dickens' Artist Daughter*. A part time lecturer as well as a writer, Lucinda is an expert in Dickens' family life and was recently awarded a fellowship to study the life of Augustus Dickens (Charles' brother and the original 'Boz') at the Newberry Library in Chicago.

LEONARDO DA VINCI – "A SECOND NATURE IN THE WORLD"

Sunday 26 February at 2pm In The Waterhall. A talk by Martin Kemp, FBA. In this talk we will be looking at how Leonardo's art and science can both be understood as a remaking of nature on the basis of deep understanding of causes and effects. In the light of this, we will be able to see how the Mona Lisa and the flying machine are the same kind of thing. The drawings in the exhibition will provide particular points of reference.

Martin Kemp FBA is Emeritus Professor in the History of Art at Trinity College, University of Oxford. He

was trained in Natural Sciences and Art History at Cambridge University and the Courtauld Institute, London. For more than 25 years he held posts at universities in Scotland, America and Canada. He has written, broadcast and curated exhibitions on imagery in art and science from the Renaissance to the present day and has written a column in *Nature* for almost 15 years. Increasingly, he has focused on issues of visualisation, modelling and representation.

EXPLORING LEONARDO - A STUDY DAY

Saturday 10 March at 10:30 - 4:45 in The Waterhall. This study day accompanying the exhibition "*Ten Drawings by Leonardo da Vinci: A Diamond Jubilee Celebration*" is an opportunity to learn more

about the wider context of Leonardo's drawings from four leading specialists. 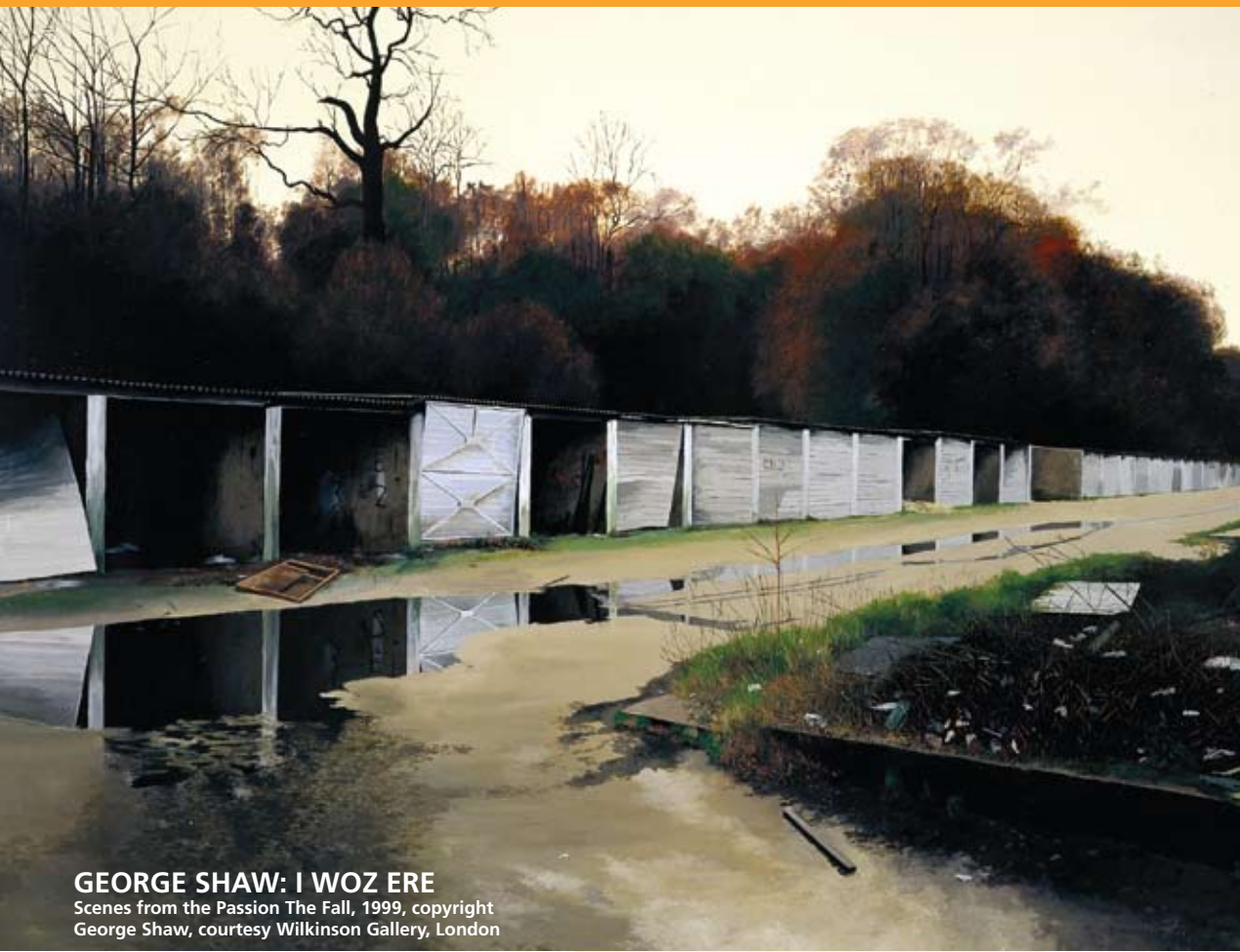

GEORGE SHAW: I WOZ ERE

Until 11 March 2012. 2011 Turner-prize nominee George Shaw will be holding his first major exhibition in his hometown of Coventry.

The exhibition is a retrospective of Shaw's work. Concerned with leaving a mark and a static memory in an ever-changing environment, the exhibition will look to the past and explore how the places Shaw has painted for the last 15 years have become new and alien to their old world.

George Shaw: I woz ere is made up of three parts. The first presents his astounding paintings created in Humbrol enamels of the Tile Hill housing estate where he grew up. These images hark back to an existence that Shaw left behind long ago; each of the paintings acting as a tombstone for a moment that's past.

The second part will hold a new series of watercolours which are of the same scenes but as they exist today. This selection of watercolours has been created specifically

for the Herbert Art Gallery & Museum. George Shaw: I woz ere will be the only exhibition in the country where people can see both his older Humbrol enamel works, and newer watercolours in the same place.

The third part will be full of Shaw's juvenilia. This informal display will showcase the artist's work from before he went to art school and provide a rare insight into some of the artist's inspirations and influences.

Rosie Addenbrooke, Senior Exhibitions and Events Officer at the Herbert said "Throughout a 15 year career Shaw has had international success, but this will be the first opportunity for those who live here to see their homes, pubs, parks and schools through the eyes of a world-renowned artist. George Shaw: I woz ere is a phenomenal collection of works that Coventry should be proud to not only host, but also to have inspired".

George Shaw was born in 1966 and brought up on the Tile Hill estate of Coventry. After school Shaw attended Sheffield Polytechnic between 1986 and 1992 gaining a BA in Fine Art and a PGCE. Following this he attended the Royal College of Art in London where he completed a MA in Painting in 1998.

George Shaw: I woz ere is funded by Arts Council England, the Stanley Thomas Johnson Foundation and Wilkinson Gallery. The exhibition is also supported by the Esmée Fairburn Foundation.

200 YEARS OF COVENTRY AND WARWICKSHIRE'S HISTORY

25 February - 22 July 2012. New exhibition puts on show rare scenes of region's past. Two hundred years of the region's picturesque views will be on display at the Herbert Art Gallery & Museum in a new FREE exhibition.

The exhibition showcases the Herbert's fine collection of watercolours usually kept in the museum's stores. Featuring well known artists including Paul Sandby, David Cox and Thomas Girtin, and

local favourites HE Cox and Sydney Bunney, the paintings range in date from the 1770s to today.

Alongside familiar scenes, such as Kenilworth Castle and Warwick Castle, there are views of picturesque villages and a reminder of the glories of old Coventry in views of the city's medieval gates, buildings and streets.

Also included in the exhibition is the William Brooke album that was acquired after a successful fundraising campaign was launched to obtain £12,000 to buy and conserve the fragile works. The previously unknown book provides new information and perspectives on the buildings and landscapes of the city in the early 1800s. Many of the buildings in the images have now been demolished such as the view of the house that fronted the undercroft in Bailey Lane. The undercroft of that property can still be reached from within the Herbert.

Wonderful Watercolours: Views of Coventry and Warwickshire will also feature items from the Herbert's archaeology and archive collections, which are linked to some of the locations shown in the paintings.

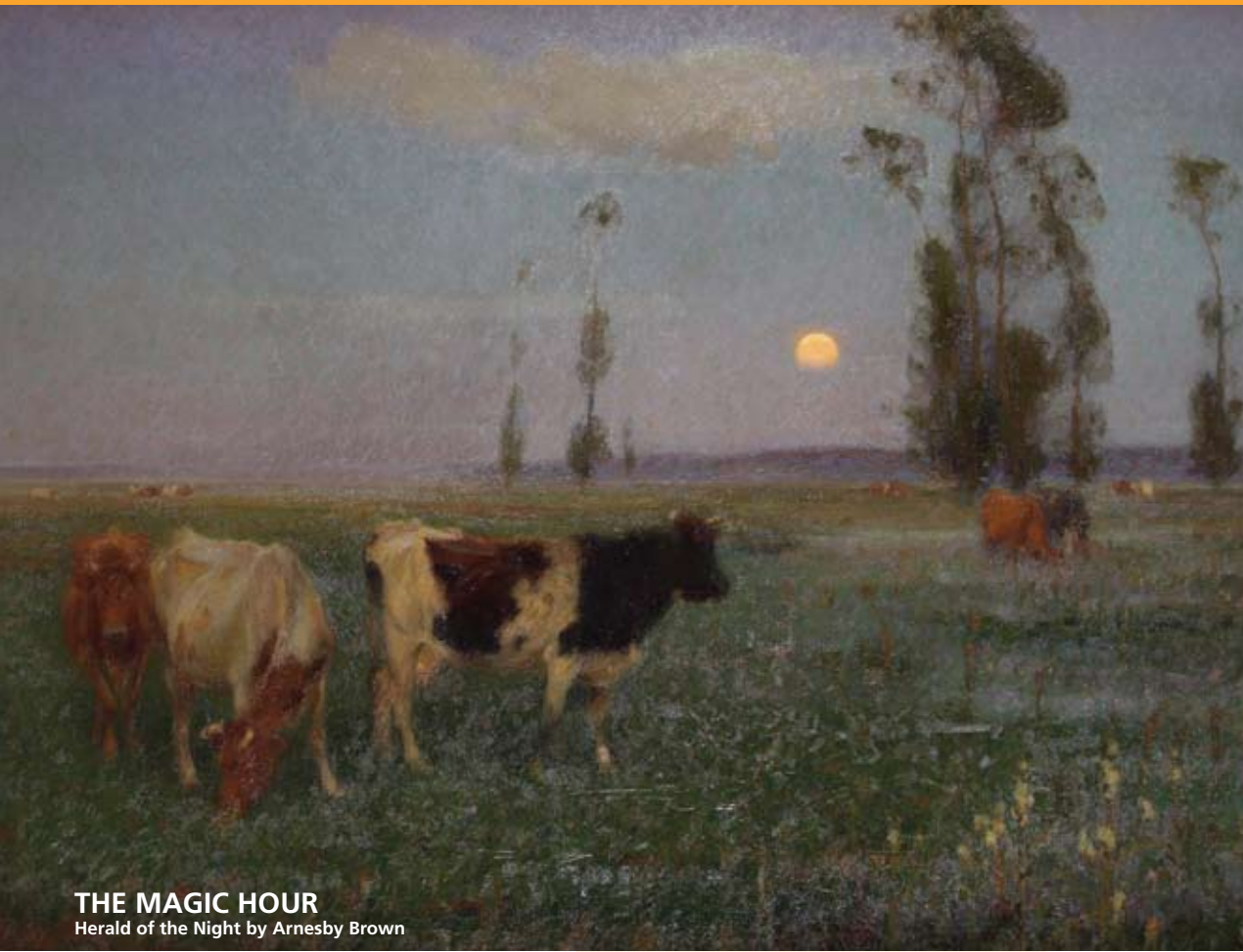

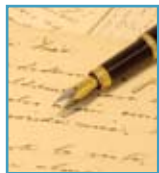

Recent Events

King's College & The Fitzwilliam Museum, Cambridge

Tuesday 29 November 2011. At midday we met at King's College and divided into three groups for tours of the College and Chapel with its outstanding architecture. The tours also extended into the local streets and some buildings of special interest.

After lunch there was time to visit the Fitzwilliam Museum and view two excellent exhibitions - "Splendour and Power: Imperial Treasures from Vienna", where we were dazzled by the glittering exhibition of jewellery, vessels and small-scale masterpieces from the Imperial Treasury in Vienna, these were displayed together for the first time in the UK. Also "Vermeer's Women: Secrets and Silence", the astonishing intimacy of interior scenes by Johannes Vermeer and his 17th century contemporaries was explored in this exhibition; at the heart was Vermeer's extraordinary painting *The Lacemaker* (c.1669-70) - one of the Musée du Louvre's most famous works, rarely seen outside Paris. The painting was joined by a choice selection of other key works by Vermeer representing the pinnacle of his mature career, and over thirty other masterpieces of genre painting from the Dutch "Golden Age".

London – The National Gallery

Friday 9 December 2011. The Leonardo da Vinci exhibition at the National Gallery was such a draw that the original coach was sold out in 3 days. Luckily we were able to obtain another 20 tickets and arranged for a second coach that was led by Ann Crump.

"Leonardo da Vinci: Painter at the Court of Milan" is the most complete display of Leonardo's rare surviving paintings ever held. An unprecedented exhibition – the first of its kind anywhere in the world – it brought together sensational international loans never before seen in the UK.

Besides the National Gallery Friends took the opportunity to visit the National Portrait Gallery, the John Soanes Museum, the War Cabinet Rooms in Whitehall or Lord Astor's house in The Temple where they displayed a temporary exhibition of works by William Morris.
